AMERICAN HAND THERAPY FOUNDATION PAYS TRIBUTE TO JUDITH BELL KROTOSKI

MARCH 30, 1945 - OCTOBER 20, 2013

Our beloved Judy passed quietly into new life on October 20, 2013 in Baton Rouge, LA following a long illness. It is not an easy task to fully comprehend or adequately share the enormity of our loss and scope of Judy's career and contributions. She was a founding member and president of ASHT, chairman of the America Hand Therapy Foundation and served as a member of the Editorial board for the Journal of Hand Therapy for many years. Mentor, colleague, and historian, Judy actively encouraged professional collaboration across disciplines, nationalities and organizations.

Friend to hand therapists worldwide, Judy gave of herself because of her driving passion and dedication to the hand therapy.

Rising to the rank of Captain during her distinguished career in the United States Public Health Service, she was present at, promoted and witnessed many of the formative moments and milestones within our profession. Fortunately for us, she also loved to archive those events because she valued how history provides perspective and insight.

Scientist, researcher, and inventor, Judy loved the investigative process. A pioneer in the pursuit of knowledge regarding sensibility testing and the use and refinement of monofilament testing, Judy's scope was international and her mission global. She sought to identify universal truth and understanding based on fact and analysis. Tenacious and steadfast, she unselfishly shared her work with the international community and presented and hosted numerous conferences. Of utmost importance to Judy was the pivotal relationship with our surgical colleagues and friends who encouraged our scientific inquiry.

As each of us reflects upon the magnitude of Judy's career and contributions, it is revealing to witness how many varying roles she fulfilled. Both personally and professionally, Judy touched many of our lives in various ways and to differing extents; however, her vision, personal caring and integrity magnetized us to her and to each other. Together we have united and accomplished her dream of greater purpose. By encouraging each of us to contribute our own unique talents, Judy helped bring to fruition the specialty of hand therapy for which we will forever be grateful.

CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE

For the American Hand Therapy Foundation, 2014 has been a year of reflection, change and transition. With remorse and sadness, in the fall of last year, we sustained a loss of one of our own, Judy Bell-Krotoski. A past chairman, Judy was a steadfast steward of the Foundation's mission, vision and guiding principles. Her contributions and legacy will be acknowledged during the September annual meeting of the American Society of Hand Therapists. The 2014 annual conference is an exceptionally appropriate setting to acknowledge Judy, as it is a meeting in conjunction with the American Society for Surgery of the Hand. As a founder of ASHT, Judy understood the importance of the support from and collaboration with hand surgeons. Her insight, diligence and historical perspective has provided us with a foundation upon which we can build and transition into the future.

A year of change, in 2014 we have welcomed two new board members, Jeanine Beasley, EdD, OTR, CHT, FAOTA and Gary Solomon MBA, MS, OTR/L, CHT. Read about their professional careers and contributions in new member highlights. Both of these new members are also on the Board of Directors of the American Society of Hand Therapists which will facilitate coordination and continuing collaboration between our two hand therapy organizations.

As part of our transition, AHTF rendered an unprecedented decision to suspend awarding our grants in 2014. The decision was made in an effort to critically evaluate the scope, intent, amount and impact of our endeavors to promote and foster meaningful research. The suspension did not include the ASHT Founders Grant or the Mary Kasch Hand Therapy Certification Scholarship, which were awarded. As part of our review process, we surveyed past award recipients asking for their feedback about the application process, implementation procedures, funding amounts and reporting expectations. We received invaluable feedback which will be incorporated into our deliberations as we reconfigure our grants and the processes we use to fund research.

Historically, a vital part of our fund raising efforts has included our annual Silent Auction. For 2014, we have added a new twist for our savvy shoppers. We will be using an online bidding web site! As usual, all items will be on display in the exhibit hall during the two hour live auction and available for inspection. All bidding will be done online using personal mobile devices even during the live auction. In order to bid, you must register as a bidder. Just click on the red Silent Auction button at www.ahtf.org and follow the bidder instructions.

Each year our Board of Directors strives to identify, promote and fund new methodology to enhance hand therapy research and education. This year, the Foundation is proud to announce the initiation of an AHTF sponsored instructional course held during the ASHT annual conference in Boston. The course is dedicated to the promotion of hand therapy education in research. We hope you will attend our inaugural instructional course entitled "The Savvy Evidence-Based Clinician's Use of PICO and CAT" which will be presented the morning of Friday, September 19th.

Guiding hand therapy research and education cannot be accomplished without the efforts of many dedicated, knowledgeable and talented individuals. It is with gratitude that I extend my personal appreciation for the efforts of our entire Board of Directors. Through their dedication, insight and service, each Board member has helped move the Foundation forward and taken us to the next level. I would especially like to thank Caroline Stegink Jansen, PT, PhD, CHT for her dedicated service as Chair of our Grant review committee for the past five years. Her diligence, collegiality and over sight has assured both our applicants and our Board of a competent grant review program reflecting the highest standards and integrity.

In 2014, AHTF continues to set precedents that acknowledge our roots and nurture a blueprint for the future. This year, following our annual Silent Auction, we will sponsor a Founder's Reception to honor not only Judy Bell Krotoski but all the founding members of ASHT. In addition, we are very excited to announce a new award in cooperation with the American Foundation for Surgery of the Hand. The focus of the award is not only to inspire research but also to foster collaboration. The inaugural 2014 Hand Surgeon-Hand Therapist Collaborative Research Award will be presented in Boston! The timing of this award could not be more appropriate as we salute Judy and all of the ASHT founders as role models of collaboration with our surgical colleagues.

News From The AHTF Grant Review Committee: Change is in the Air

The AHTF offers three grants aiming to foster evidence based practice and share knowledge and bringing cultures of hand therapy together, two awards to conduct scientific inquiry and one travel grant aimed at education and cultural exchange.

The purpose of the "Burkhalter Young Investigator Grant" – honoring Dr. William Burkhalter (1928-1992), a long time advocate and promoter of hand therapy - is to support scientific clinical research in the field of hand and upper limb rehabilitation. The award is intended for novice occupational and/or physical therapists investigators, regardless of their age!

The "Grab the Evidence Grant" was established in response to the growing need to fund basic research science and evidence based studies in hand and upper limb rehabilitation. The purpose of the award is designed to serve as a stepping stone for a skilled researcher and/or research team to develop a line of research with the potential to generate larger external funding.

The purpose of the "Evelyn Mackin Grant for Education by a Traveling Hand Therapist" is to foster the visibility and quality of hand and upper limb rehabilitation all over the world through education and communication by funding traveling by a practicing occupational or physical therapist and share the "pearls" of hand rehabilitation learned from mutual experience. In the past year, a recess from funding was taken to start a process of internal rejuvenation.

In addition to the AHTF grants, the AHTF also administers the "ASHT Founders Grant" funded by the ASHT. Please, visit the AHTF booth at the upcoming ASHT annual meeting for a listing of publications that were the direct or subsequent result of funding by the AHTF and visit the AHTF website at www.ahtf.org for the most up-to-date information on availability and application procedures.

Changes are currently underway to make the application process easier and state-of-the-art. Keep your eyes on the website, and never hesitate to contact our new Grant Review Chair. Jeanine Beasley, EdD, OTR/L, CHT, FAOTA

Jeanine Beasley, EdD, OTR, CHT, FAOTA, is an associate professor at Grand Valley State University, in the Occupational Therapy Program. She founded a hand clinic at Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Jeanine is a frequent guest lecturer, and has spoken in 13 states and internationally. She has authored and co-authored 7 book chapters and 5 journal articles related to arthritis, splinting, and postoperative management of implant arthroplasties. She recently published two chapters in the sixth edition of Rehabilitation of the Hand (Mosby). Awards include: 2012 Fellow of the American Occupational Therapy Association, 1998 ASHT outstanding clinical paper, 1999 Master Clinician from the Michigan Occupational Therapy Association, and in 2001 she was named the Therapist of the Year by the South Kent AMBUCS. She is a member of the advisory board for the West Michigan Region Arthritis Foundation, Michigan Chapter.



Gary Solomon, MBA, MS, OTR/L, CHT

Gary graduated from the Occupational Therapy program at Washington University in St. Louis in 1993, and became a Certified Hand Therapist in 1999. He also received his MBA in 2010. He has worked at Chicago Metro Hand Therapy alongside the physicians of Hand to Shoulder Associates since 1998, and is Adjunct Faculty at Governors State University. His primary area of clinical interest is the post operative management of traumatic upper extremity injuries. Gary currently serves as Secretary Treasurer for the American Society of Hand Therapists (ASHT), and is the immediate past Education Division Director. He also lectures and teaches continuing education courses throughout the United States.

All bidding will continue on-line through the website until 7:15 PM, Thursday, September 18, 2014, adding excitement to the event.

DONATION INSTRUCTIONS

Minimum value per item requirement this year is \$25.00. Items with a minimum value of \$25 are being required due to space constraints for auction tables. If you have multiple smaller value items, please combine them to meet/exceed this minimum value.

NOTE: Dollar value assignments of items are the responsibility of those who contribute items. Due to IRS regulations, AHTF does not assign values to items.

Items need to be submitted to the website link by September 8, 2014.

If you would like to contribute items, please visit the AHTF website at www.ahtf.org and click on "SILENT AUCTION" and the sub-heading "Donor Instructions." This page contains the easy step-by-step instructions.

We are requiring that all items must be registered on the bidding website. Items not registered will not be accepted.

The web site will ask you for:

- An electronic photo of the item
- Contributor name as you wish it to appear on the bid sheet
- A one sentence description of each item
- · Dollar value of each item

Once you complete the donation, go back to www.ahtf.org to print Shipping Instructions for the items. This avoids having to carry the item with you to Boston and facilitates the on-site registration process.
