The <u>Evelyn Mackin Grant for Education by a Traveling Hand Therapist</u> was awarded in 2018 to Jane Fedorczyk, PT, PhD, CHT, ATC for the project entitled: "Introducing Hand Therapy Practice in Rwanda." Jane is scheduled to present her results at the upcoming ASHT meeting.

The 2018 <u>ASHT Founders Grant</u> was awarded to Nicholas Heebner, PhD, LAT, in collaboration with Jenny Dorich, MBA, OTR/L, CHT. The project "Biomechanical Validation of Push-Up and Pull-Up Progression Program" is in progress and will contribute to our shoulder rehabilitation evidence. Dr. Heebner has completed the push up component this study. Look for the published results in the near future.

I hope everyone is having a great summer and ready for the upcoming ASHT Annual Conference in Washington, DC. I would like to thank all of our donors and corporate sponsors. I would also like to extend a special thank you to the California Hand Therapy Association. Your generous contributions over the past two years totaling \$15,000 have helped to fund upper extremity research through the AHTF grants. I would also like to thank the members of the Tri-Alliance (ASHT, HTCC, and AHTF) for their continued support.

During the 2019 grant cycle, there was a total of \$55,000 available to support research and education. This funding comes from the generosity of our donors and through the fundraising efforts of the foundation's board of directors. The funds provided by the Tri-Alliance (ASHT, HTCC and AHTF) allow the American Hand Therapy Foundation to support the \$30,000 Founders Grant. For this grant cycle the AHTF funded \$39,930 in research grants, making this the most significant funding cycle in the history of the organization.

The AHTF has been working hard to meet the needs of our profession and as a result, held our third annual retreat in Houston, Texas. The primary focus of the retreat was to identify ways to stimulate growth and development of the AHTF. During the retreat, the board established fundraising goals and set priorities for the 2019-2020 calendar year. Our objectives include improving our current fund-raising efforts and therapist engagement in the AHTF, focusing on the future of hand therapy research, and continuing to work with the Tri-Alliance to coordinate our efforts for hand therapy research.

The Annual ASHT Conference offers valuable face-to-face time that will assist in building relationships and raising awareness of the AHTF. The Magic of the Placebo: The Role of the Placebo in Medicine, Surgery and Therapy

Throughout the history of medicine the placebo has played an important role in the healing response of patients. While sugar pills as a placebo are accepted in the medical model, many would be surprised to learn how effective the placebo is in treating the surgical patient. Empathy and care shown to the patient by the physician and therapist may be the most influential placebo there is. This lecture will focus on the ubiquitous effects of the placebo and how they improve patient outcomes.

About a year ago, I was honored to give an overview of the American Hand Therapy Foundation's vision to the attendees at a state-level hand therapy conference. I opened my presentation with a question, "How many of you think that research is important for the future of the profession?" Unequivocally, everyone in the room responded with their hand held high! I agree. Nothing is more important to our profession (particularly in this day and time) than research that provides guidance to assure the best possible patient care outcomes and validates the benefit for the cost of our professional services. There are three ways each occupational and physical therapist can support this effort: design and carryout a research project; affiliate with researchers to contribute clinical data in support of research; or, provide funding to support research.

Most therapists, for a variety of very practical and valid reasons, will opt to support research through their donations of time or money. The American Hand Therapy Foundation, whose mission is to improve patient outcomes by promoting evidence-based practice through funding clinical and scientific research and education, is an excellent organization and worthy of your support.

So why is the AHTF worthy of your donations? The AHTF funds the research that supports your profession. The AHTF has an entirely volunteer Board of Directors. Over 90% of donations go directly to funding grants and scholarships -administrative and fundraising expenses vs. net capital averages 4.8% per year. Board members are not compensated for their service or reimbursed for personal expenses related to tuition, lodging or travel to the ASHT annual meeting. Board members vote independently with regard to granting awards and making financial decisions. The AHTF has by-laws governing the organization and board meetings are documented with detailed minutes. AHTF has a conflict of interest policy for its board. The AHTF financials are reviewed annually by an independent auditor. The AHTF only funds qualified applicants and has policies to hold recipients accountable for the production of their funded projects. The AHTF maintains a 501(c)3 status with IRS, making your donations tax deductible. Donations to the AHTF go toward hand therapy research and are an excellent investment in our profession. We invite you to become more familiar with the American Hand Therapy Foundation and its many projects.

NEWS from the Congress of the International Federation of Associations for Hand Therapy (IFSHT)

From June 17-21, 2019 the International Federation of Societies of Hand Therapy (IFSHT) and the International Federation of Societies for Surgery of the Hand (IFSSH) hosted their combined congress in Berlin, Germany. The theme of the meeting was "Building Bridges -Together Hand in Hand", and this truly happened.

Judy Bell-Krokowski, one of the ASHT founders, was posthumously awarded the IFSHT Cristina Alegri Award for Innovation in Hand Therapy. Her name was submitted against 7 other candidates from around the world. Dorit Aaron, MA, OTR/L, FAOTA, CHT, AHTF Board member, accepted the award in her name and gave it to ASHT for safe keeping.

At the inaugural presentation of the Lifetime Achievement Award, two former ASHT Presidents were included among the 13 pioneers in hand therapy: Judy Colditz, OT/L, CHT, FAOTA and Evelyn Mackin, PT, CHT.

Dorit Aaron MA, OTR/L, FAOTA, CHT was the IFSHT meeting program Co-chair, pictured here with her German Co-Chairs Beate Jung and Antje Wellbrock-Wicknig. Dorit represented the AHTF and advocated for the funding of hand therapy research.

Board member Caroline Jansen, PT, PhD, CHT together with Susan De Klerk from South Africa, organized a panel with representatives from each continent to compare the service delivery, practice and education of hand therapy within their respective countries. The panel included therapists from Ghana and other underserved areas of the world and was inter-professional; occupational therapists, physical therapists, and hand surgeons. Attendees were interested in learning of the many similarities in the practice of hand therapy across the globe.
