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### Message from AHTF Chair

In today's ever-changing and complicated world driven by the current pandemic, the profession of hand therapy has continued to maintain its identity and value to the community recognized through our designation as essential providers. The essential provider status continues to be carried through the hand therapy profession's focus on providing treatment through science and research. I am happy to say that The Foundation continues to move forward, experiencing growth and providing quality research to sustain our current level of practice.

The Foundation was honored to receive a generous donation from Doris Ann Slack. Her contribution exceeded \$100,000, and a new fund was established to enhance the Foundation's current grants. The Doris Ann Slack donation has allowed the Foundation to reach a new milestone.

The Foundation continues to offer generous grants, with available funding exceeding \$75,000 on an annual basis. The newest initiative is a collaboration with the American Society for Surgery of the Hand. A \$20,000 grant has been established to allow the cooperation between a hand surgeon and hand therapist on a research project. This collaborative grant will increase communication and teamwork between the two organizations.

The significant level of funding and expansion of collaboration is due to the extreme talent and diversity of the Foundation's Board of Directors. These selfless professionals dedicate themselves to the enhancement of research and functional outcomes. They commit themselves to many hours and projects raising money, evaluating research proposals, awarding research grants, and tracking investigators' progress. The Foundations' Board of Directors' hard work and dedication have allowed substantial monetary growth enabling grants significant for the future of research.

In this election cycle, I am stepping down as chairman for the Foundation Board of Directors. It has been my privilege and honor to serve on such an outstanding board. 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### **AHTF Grants Committee Update 2020**

The AHTF grants committee has worked hard to support our mission of improving patient outcomes and our vision of establishing a strong evidence base for all upper extremity evaluations and interventions. The granting infrastructure was reviewed, strengthened where needed, and expanded. We thank all whose efforts make this work possible!

The 2020 grant awarding cycle for the AHTF is now complete. All applications underwent rigorous peer review and the applicants received written compilations of the reviewer comments to support the funding decisions made. The hope is that applicants will use the feedback to further their research agendas and to consider making future applications for funding by the AHTF. The AHTF awarded the 2020 Burkhalter New Investigator Grant in the amount of \$10,000 to Emily S. Ho, PhD, MEd, OT Reg. (Ont.), and her colleagues Kristin Davidge, MD, Sevan Hopyan, PhD, MD, Andrew Price, MD, and Howard Clarke, PhD, MD for their project entitled "Musculoskeletal Characteristics of Elbow Flexion Contractures in Infants and Children with Brachial Plexus Injury." Dr. Emily S. Ho is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy at the University of Toronto and a clinician-investigator in the Division of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at the Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids). Toronto, Canada. Her current research program centers on patient engagement and outcomes research in children and adolescents with upper extremity musculoskeletal conditions.

Per Dr. Ho, "It is truly an honor to be the recipient of the AHFT Burkhalter New Investigator Award. As I embark on a career as an academic researcher, this award fuels my resolve to advance scientific evidence in upper extremity rehabilitation science to optimize functioning and quality of life of youth with upper limb conditions and their families. With the support of the Burkhalter award, our multidisciplinary research team in the SickKids Brachial Plexus program will investigate the muscular, joint, and osseous characteristics of elbow flexion contractures secondary to brachial plexus birth injury. This research will provide objective evidence to support proposed etiologies and the results will provide hand therapists working with this pediatric population a clear road map to discern optimal treatment modalities to address joint stiffness, muscle shortening, and/or muscle weakness associated with these contractures."



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### AHTF Grants Committee Update 2020, page 2

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The AHTF board of directors wishes to thank the volunteers who served as expert peer reviewers for the Grant Application Review committee during the most recent grant cycle. The grant application reviews are a major undertaking that is made possible only by the efforts of each of the volunteers, both working individually and in concert as a team committed to reviewing, discussing, and making unbiased funding decisions in support of upper limb rehabilitation. Every single contribution made by every single team member made a difference and contributed to this year's success. New funding opportunities have arisen during the past year. The AHTF is excited to have partnered with the American Foundation for Surgery of the Hand for a collaborative research grant in the amount of \$20,000. The grant was offered as a one-time opportunity open to a hand surgeon/hand therapist team studying any hand/upper limb surgery or therapy topic. Applications were submitted in June of this year and are currently undergoing a peer review process. Stay tuned for more information about this exciting opportunity.

Another thrilling happening for the AHTF is the creation of the Doris Ann Slack Upper Extremity Education and Research Innovation Fund to support clinical innovations and education in the field of upper extremity rehabilitation in perpetuity.

Doris Ann Slack, a master clinician and educator whose life-long reverence for the hand and upper extremity profoundly benefited and equally inspired her patients and students. Her dedicated service to others is epitomized by this legacy gift to the American Hand Therapy Foundation. The Doris Ann Slack Fund is the bedrock that sustains the pre-existing AHTF grants, just as a teacher imparts the foundational knowledge that prepares future generations for research and advanced practice. Doris' selection of AHTF for this generous endowment is a genuine reflection of her desire to improve patient outcomes by promoting evidence-based practice. Simply stated, it is a perpetuation of her life's work and her admiration for the miraculous design and competence of the upper extremity.

Each year, the AHTF Board of Directors will designate proceeds from the Doris Ann Slack Fund toward additional funding of one of the AHTF existing grants to enhance evidence-based practice and improve patient outcomes. Currently under development is an educational program in conjunction with national upper extremity professional organizations (i.e., ASSH, ASHT, AAHS, APTA, AOTA) to disseminate evidence-based surgical and rehabilitative innovations to therapists that are deemed to directly enhance patient care.

Thanks again to all volunteers, applicants, donors, grant committee members, and therapists creating and using evidence-based practice to help their patients flourish in their daily activities!

The mission of the AHTF is to improve patient outcomes by promoting evidence-based practice through funding clinical and scientific research and education. "A clinical profession is built on frameworks of theory and research that define the nature of the profession and the specific methods it uses to accomplish its unique mission."

Keeping with this concept, in October, all members of the American Society of Hand Therapists and all current Certified Hand Therapists will receive an important AHTF 2020 Research Questionnaire via email. The questionnaire is designed to survey stakeholders' perceptions of opportunities to create and utilize research, as well as perceptions of educational needs.

The AHTF wants to hear from clinicians, educators, and researchers about funding priorities for research, scientific workforce training, and clinical education. Input will initially be gathered through the electronic 2020 questionnaire, and in early 2021, via web-based focus groups. We are seeking responses from therapists with all levels of practice experience, all levels of scientific experience, and from all types of practice settings. All responses are important!

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# Meet the new AHTF Board Members 2020 Marsha Lawrence

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Marsha Lawrence earned her B.S. in Physical Therapy from the University of Illinois Medical Center in Chicago in 1978 and began her career at the University of Chicago, where she specialized in wound care and rehabilitation following thermal injuries. She learned orthosis fabrication through trial and error (we only had orthoplast!), using bent hangers for outriggers and prowling hardware and fabric stores for "splint components" and toy stores for "exercise equipment".

Working with burn and frostbite injuries led to a focus on hand rehabilitation. She relocated to Washington and worked in pulmonary P.T. at George Washington University Hospital (down the street from the White House) but decided hand rehabilitation was her true calling and transferred to the Curtiss National Hand Center in Baltimore. She earned her CHT in 1991 and her DPT from Arcadia University in PA in 2017. She has practiced in a variety locations including Duke University Medical Center, the University of Massachusetts Medical Center, Fallon Health Care in Worcester, MA, private practice in Overland Park, KS and most recently, the University of Iowa.

She completed Pilates training through Polestar in 2011 and incorporated these skills and equipment into upper extremity rehabilitation. She authored "Orthopedic Management of the Wrist and Hand" in Fundamental Orthopedic Management for the Physical Therapist Assistant, in 2011, 2016, and has recently submitted an update for an upcoming edition; co-authored a clinical practice guideline for conservative management of carpal tunnel syndrome and "Therapists management of nerve compressions at the wrist" in the Seventh edition of Rehabilitation of the Hand. Marsha has presented at ASHT, APTA CSM and for regional Hand Therapy Associations on a variety of topics ranging from wound care to advocacy and policy regulation. Marsha presently serves as the payment and practice chair of the APTA Hand Academy and also as their Federal Affairs Liaison. She is a member of the APTA Public Policy and Advocacy Committee. Working with national policy has reinforced her determination to support research demonstrating efficacy of hand therapy for upper extremity injuries and conditions and she was excited to join the AHTF Board in late 2019. In her spare time, Marsha stays connected to her Chicago roots where both of her sons live; is a die-hard fan of the Chicago Cubs; and closer to home, continues to support the Kansas City Symphony where she sang with the Symphony Chorus for 16 years. She continues to study voice (virtually) and is hoping to resume once the PHE has resolved!
